Additionally, consider being seen by a travel medicine specialist, which are available in most clinic systems.

Consider carrying a medical alert card or wearing a medical alert bracelet or necklace that identifies your medical condition.

Pack an adequate amount of all required medications and medical supplies. Currently, the Transportation Security Administration (<u>www.tsa.gov</u>) website reports that:

• You can bring your medications in pill or solid form in unlimited amounts, as long as they are screened.

- Medication in liquid form is allowed in carry-on bags **in excess of 3.4 ounc**es, in reasonable quantities for the flight. It is not necessary to place medically required liquids in a zip-top bag. However, you must tell the officer you have medically necessary liquids at the start of the screening checkpoint process. Medically required liquids may be subjected to additional screening.
- You can carry medications in either carry-on or checked baggage. It's recommended you keep these items in your carry-on, in the event you need immediate access.



Novak Unit # 199 auxiliary will be wearing a red Memorial Poppy, as a symbol of the price of war and the sacrifice of millions, as a sign of their appreciation this month of May and the Memorial Day weekend. The 900,000 members of the American Legion Auxiliary, the world's largest women's patriotic service organization, are asking everyone to wear a Poppy on Memorial Day weekend.

"Wear it in honor of the millions of Americans who have willingly served our nation, all too many of whom made the ultimate sacrifice, said Jane Kalies, Auxiliary President, of the Gosz/Novak Unit #199 Reedsville.

The Poppy also honors Wisconsin's disabled veterans at the Zablocki VA Medical Center in Milwaukee who make the red crepe paper Poppy. Wisconsin's Red Poppies provide financial and therapeutic benefits to these veterans, as well as the thousands of veterans and their families who benefit from the donations collected from the distribution of the Auxiliary Poppy.

In the battlefields of Belgium during World War I, poppies grew wild amid the ravages of war. The overturned soils of battle enabled the poppy seeds to be covered, allowing them to grow and forever serve as a reminder of the bloodshed of war.

This is the 97th Anniversary of the National American Legion Organization, which was chartered by congress directly after the ending of World War 1. The Reedsville Post of the Gosz American Legion had it's beginning in 1921 and the Reedsville Auxiliary was formed shortly after. In 1946, after the death of Charles Novak of Reedsville, who was serving his country, and was killed in an airplane crash in Texas, the name of the Post was changed to Gosz/Novak American Legion Post #199.

Each year the Gosz/Novak Auxiliary Unit chooses a Poppy Princess from their Junior Members. This year the Poppy Princess is, Abby Towne, daughter of Laurie Towne of Reedsville. She is the granddaughter of Bonnie O'Connell of Brillion, and the late Keith O'Connell. Abby is in the 3rd grade at Reedsville Elementary School.

Please join Reedsville's American Legion Auxiliary on Friday and Saturday, May 6th and 7th, and May 13th and 14th, as members distribute Poppies at the Town Mart in Reedsville, and various other businesses' in the community throughout the month of May. There will also be a distribution of poppies at Holy Family Church in Brillion on May 14th and 15th. following the Masses.

All the funds raised by the unit through the distribution of the poppies will be used for veterans and their families, and for different veteran programs in our district, state and nation. Speaker Bio



Kim Meeder's life was torn apart at the early age of nine by her parents' murder-suicide. She has since chosen to rise above the pain and become a powerful influence in the lives of many disadvantaged youth. On the day of her parents' funeral, Kim experienced the special emotional comfort a horse could provide. This healing refuge became the foundation for all that was to follow. Through the love of a little mare and a merciful God, Kim's life was saved. In 1995, Kim and her husband Troy made the decision to transform heir 9-acre cinder quarty into a ranch for kids. Crystal Peaks Youth

their 9-acre cinder quarry into a ranch for kids. Crystal Peaks Youth Ranch (CPYR) was born. This unique non-profit organization rescues abused and neglected horses and nurtures them back to health. These same horses are then used in the ranch's riding program for children. Approximately 85% of the children who come to CPYR are disadvantaged in some way. The ranch focuses on individual instruction for each participant with one leader, one child and one horse...free of charge. Having assisted in the rescue of more than 300 horses, CPYR currently supports 25 to 30 horses and welcomes four to five thousand visitors every year. The ranch also works closely with nearly all local youth and family organizations. Although the ranch activities are designed for "at risk" youth, all children are welcome. In 2003, Multnomah Publishers released Kim's first book, Hope Rising. Her book has been well received nationwide and abroad and has been translated into German, Chinese and Slavic. It has spurred numerous requests for magazine, television and radio interviews. Her radio interview on Focus on the Family with Dr. James Dobson was rated their number one show of 2004. Bridge Called Hope, Kim's second highly anticipated book was released September 2006. It was also featured on Focus on the Family and became one of the top five shows of 2007. Her third book Blind Hope, an unwanted dog and the woman she rescued was released in 2010. Her Blind Hope interview with Focus on the family became one of the top five shows for 2010. Her interview with Family Talk Radio was chosen as their premier show in 2010. The message of hope through this book has continued to spread nationwide and abroad and has been translated into Korean as well. Her fourth book, Fierce Beauty, choosing to stand for what matters most, released in October 2011 is rapidly gaining notoriety and praise, some of which comes from endorsements by Dr. James Dobson and Luanne Craine-Family Talk Radio, Dr. Julie Slattery-Focus on the Family, Meredith Andrews-Recording Artist, and Chris Telfer-Oregon State Senator. Kim Meeder is an accomplished speaker and has addressed audiences across the country from churches and book clubs to U.S. Government policy councils and a portion of the U.S. Senate in Washington, D.C. In 2005, Kim's service was acknowledged through a Regional Red Cross Hero's Award.. In April 2004 Kim was nominated for the Regional Jefferson Award, an award to encourage and honor individuals for their achievements and contributions through public and community service. Kim then went on to be awarded the National Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis Award for Greatest Public Service Benefiting Local Communities at a ceremony in Washington, D.C. In addition to her writing, speaking and duties at CPYR, Kim is also a gifted athlete. She competed on a national level in Nordic ski racing and participated in the U.S. Olympic biathlon trials. She has also set two world records in power lifting. Kim has climbed many of the highest peaks in Oregon, Washington and California. One of her newest interests is surfing. If the sport will take Kim into the great outdoors, you will probably find her there!
