

All taxes must be paid by check or money order and made payable to the Village of Reedsville.

Cat & Dog Licenses: Unspayed females and unneutered males are \$10.00 each. Spayed females and neutered males are \$5.00 each. You must show proof of a valid rabies shot. Please make out a separate check for the licenses as it goes into a different account.

Clerk/Treasurer's Office Hours: Monday thru Thursday, 8:00 AM to 3:00 PM and Friday 8:00 am to 1:00 pm. The Clerk/Treasurer's office will be closed Dec. 19th thru Dec. 26th, and at noon on December 30th.





VITAMIN D3

Once thought to have been conquered, vitamin D deficiency is now recognized as an epidemic in the United States. In fact, it is estimated that 50,000-70,000 people in the U.S. die prematurely from cancer each year due to insufficient vitamin D. The primary source of vitamin D for both children and adults is from sun exposure, not from diet. Very few foods naturally contain vitamin D (fatty fish, egg yolks, and liver) or are fortified with vitamin D.

Perhaps the most well-known function of vitamin D is to regulate calcium absorption and metabolism for bone health. Vitamin D promotes intestinal absorption of calcium and phosphorous, facilitates calcium transport, and reduces urinary calcium loss in order to keep calcium in the body and spare calcium stores in the bones. Vitamin D also promotes calcium deposition in bones and is required for the proper utilization of magnesium.

However, vitamin D also exerts profound effects on human immune function. Vitamin D acts as an immune system modulator, increasing the activity of macrophages (white blood cells that destroy bacteria, protozoa and tumor cells) and providing anti-inflammatory effects. Growing scientific evidence has also demonstrated an association between low levels of vitamin D and a greater risk of diseases such as hypertension, cardiovascular disease, depression, obesity, Type 1 diabetes, respiratory tract infections, osteoporosis, cancer, cystic fibrosis and autoimmune diseases such as multiple sclerosis, rheumatoid arthritis and systemic lupus. Vitamin D deficiency has been found to cause widespread or isolated pain and is often misdiagnosed as fibromyaligia or chronic pain syndrome.

MY 2nd FAVORITE HORSE AMBER



Remember the Village Star?

Many years ago, in a small village called Reedsville, the Christmas spirit enveloped the streets and the villagers as well. There were large, dazzling evergreens at every intersection, decorating the main street with the joy that was felt from within. People really outdid themselves that year and you could tell that the wait for Christmas and all the promise and hope that it held was in full swing. It was that same year when Arthur Boettcher decided to make Reedsville a symbol of Christmas for all to see. A large, illuminated star was placed on top of the water tower to shine over Reedsville and its festive villagers. Arthur had placed the star up high in honor of his father, Herman, who had been a sheriff in the area for a long time.

Years had passed and, as Christmases came and went, the star's light started to lose its luster as bulbs broke or burned out. Maintenance on the towering spectacle was near impossible and eventually the star just sat on top of the tower for years with no glow, no shine, and no sparkle. The years that the star stood dark were years that the villagers felt something was missing.

Leonard Miller owned a service station for 55 years across the street from the firehouse, which was located right next to the water tower that the star was perched on. Every time the firefighters went on a call, Leonard would help by running across the street and shutting the doors for them. Miller's daughter, Betty (Dolezal) remembers that her Dad was a special and loving person. He spent a lot time with her at the station and taught her a lot about giving and community. Betty went on to become the Reedsville Village Clerk/Treasurer and served the community for several years. In 1986, the death of her father brought on an idea. Betty wanted to make a new Christmas Star to be placed up high in honor and memory of her kind and generous father and mother. Betty Dolezal funded the efforts to have the star made again and Reedsville Village Board Member, Norbert Schuh, designed a star with the bulbs protected from the weather by Plexiglas so only minimal maintenance would be necessary. The village hoisted the star to its previous home, the old water tower next to the old firehouse. Living near the water tower Betty remembered, "I would go to bed at night and see the star from my bedroom window. I knew Dad was looking down at me. I knew he was still with me."

The Reedsville Christmas Star shone brightly for years. When it needed maintenance Norbert and his son Bill would take care of the star. The star was special to the village and those who lived nearby. It had become a visual reminder that home is not too far away, and for those who were visiting, it was a smile on a cold winter's night and for those who traveled on highway 10, it was an old friend. A few years ago the old water tower had to be removed from the Village due to old age. When the tower was removed, so was the star. It now resides in the old firehouse museum, housed with other village historical artifacts. Yet, still to this day many villagers think that someday it would be nice to see that familiar, shining beacon calling to us once again, the season is upon us - Christmas is here.

Reedsville School District Parents, Community Members and Taxpayers,

On Monday October 24th the School Board certified a tax levy of \$4,498,017 which resulted in a mill rate of \$13.88. This is a 16.7% increase in the mill rate over last year's rate of \$11.90. Relative to other districts in the area this is a significant increase both in the levy and the mill rate. I want to provide you, as community members and taxpayers, with background information as to why our mill rate has increased so significantly over the past three years.

During the 2008-2009 school year the mill rate for the Reedsville School District was \$8.47. In April 2009, the Administration and School Board presented the Reedsville School District community with a referendum which would allow for a remodeling of the high school at a cost of nearly 10 million dollars; and a second recurring referendum which allowed the district to exceed the revenue cap by \$350,000 for each of three years.

These referendums were presented to the public framed in the context that the long-term sustainability of the district was dependent upon the successful passing of the referendum. In subsequent voting, the building referendum passed with 56% of the vote, and the referendum to exceed revenue caps passed with 61% of the vote.

The projections at the time of the vote indicated that in order to pay for the building and operational levy override that the mill rate would raise from \$8.47 in 2008-2009 to \$10.13 in 2009-2010, to \$11.26 in 2010-2011 and \$12.29 in 2011-2012, and then stabilize from that point on. In actuality, the mill rate increased from \$8.47 in 2008-2009 to \$10.03 in 2009-2010, to \$11.90 in 2010-2011(which included an under levy of \$200,000), and to \$13.88 in the current year.

Why did the projections miss the mark? The projections were based upon a property value increase of 3% per year, and a continuation of state aide at the level which had been historically realized. As it turned out, the property level decreased over several years, and state aid has been dramatically reduced.

Recognizing that our taxpayers have made a substantial commitment to assuring the long-range health of the district, the administration and Board takes the role of financial stewardship very seriously. Total expenditures for the current school year have been reduced by over \$100,000. During the past year both certified and noncertified staff have increased their shared cost of health care premiums (to 12%) and are paying the employee full share of their retirement contribution to the Wisconsin Retirement Savings. This has resulted in an overall reduction in staff compensation and a savings to the taxpayer of approximately \$240,000. In addition, we have realized significant cost savings prior to the beginning of the school year by reducing staff and cutting costs relative to materials and supplies.

Going forward our district will make every effort possible to provide education to the scholars of the Reedsville School district, which reflect both high educational standards and fiscal responsibilities. The dramatic increases of the mill rate due to increases in the capital debt and levy override have run their course per the projections outlined at the time of the referendum.

We have beautiful schools that will be paid for in full in less than 12 years and will serve the young people of our communities for years to come. While we will still have real challenges in the long and short term, our district is in a position assure that it will serve the needs of our district community both today and long into the future.

Finally, thanks to all of our residents, taxpayers, and supporters. The commitment you have made is greatly appreciated by our scholars and the staff who serve them. The Reedsville School District has a long and proud legacy of serving our area communities. Your decision to support the referendums of three years ago have given assurance that we will be able to continue this legacy of service.
