#### **Notes from the Village Hall**

**Public Input Meeting**: A public input meeting will be held on Monday, September 21, 2009 at 7:00 pm at the Reedsville Municipal Building, 217 Menasha Street, Reedsville, WI. Items to be discussed will be recycling pick-up, Well #5 and the Police Department.

#### **School Renovation News**

Many of you might have asked yourself this summer, "Didn't we vote to remodel the high school last April? What is happening?"

I waited this long to report to you on purpose. I did not want to tell you something in May, only to see it change over the summer. I wanted you, the owners, to know the facts. We are at that point.

I want to share information about three parts of the remodeling project: 1) design, 2) possible relocation of Mud Creek, and 3) finances.

The design of the remodel/addition is about 95% complete. Bids will go out during the first week of September and awarded later that month, with construction beginning in earnest in October.

Much of what you saw, leading up to the April vote, remains. However, some significant changes have been made and I'm eager to share them.

- 1. We were able to move the art department down to the northwest corner of the building. This means that all applied/hands-on educational offerings will be in that 25% of the building. There will be a project room and computer lab that can be used by a single department or used in joint efforts.
- 2. The choir will move into the new addition and its former room will become an all-school computer lab.
- 3. Both the main entrance and the gym/lobby entrance will be remodeled to make them energy and security efficient
- 4. As promised, security will be a priority. Security cameras will cover both the inside and outside of the building.
- 5. Technology is also a priority. In addition to the new all-school computer lab, the entire building will be re-wired to meet not only today's technology needs, but those needs of the future.

We are also exploring the possibility of moving the channel of Mud Creek. The creek would still enter from the 4th street bridge and exit under the Manitowoc Street bridge, but between those points the channel would make a wider curve to the north and east. This would do several things for the project. It would eliminate the need to replace the entire wall now protecting the school from the creek. It would create an almost park-like setting to the north of the school. It would create outside educational opportunities for biology, vocational agriculture, and others. And, it is estimated the cost would be about half of the cost of replacing the wall.

We intend to submit an application to the DNR sometime this fall. We expect a decision sometime around Christmas and the work to begin next spring. We are cautiously optimistic that DNR will grant permission.

Like the previous building project, we will sell bonds to fund the cost. Unlike the previous project, the bonds are completely new. We have divided the funding into thirds. The first was closed on August 10. These are called 'Build America Bonds' or BAB's. The interest rate is 3.25%. The way these bonds are different is the federal government will subsidize about 33% of the interest payments. You may have read about the second phase. These are 'Qualified School Construction Bonds', or QSCB's. These bonds are interest free and we were awarded \$3.575 Million, which was the 6th highest award in Wisconsin. We will issue those bonds in October. The last third will again be BAB's and will be issued after the first of the year, so we do not know the interest rate.

All of the above is good news because of the positive impact on our debt repayment schedule. However, we also have to deal with state funding problems. We anticipate getting about \$92,000 less in state aid than we got last year.

We estimated, in April, that the remodel/addition referendum and the operational referendum would increase taxes this year by \$1.66 for each thousand in valuation a property owner has. We will not know the exact amount until October, but as of now, we think it will be \$1.69/\$1,000.

This is an exciting time for our district. We are confident you will be pleased with the final product and we look forward to showing the new facility to you when it's completed. We anticipate completion sometime next fall.

#### **Camoquilt Project**

The first camouflage quilt was designed and made by Linda Wieck in April of 2006. Her son-in-law, Todd, was being deployed to Iraq and asked her to make him a quilt to take along. His specifications were that it be small, made from camouflage cloth, and it needed to have cotton batting. While Todd was at Camp Shelby, MS for training prior to being deployed, other soldiers in his unit saw the quilt and wanted to buy one. Todd asked Linda if she could make each of them a quilt and they would pay her for them. She scrambled to finish all 48 before they left for Iraq in July of 2006.

After the local newspaper published an article about her work, one of the readers asked Linda to conduct a workshop to train others to make the quilts. All the money needed for materials and supplies were donated so the quilts could be given to the soldiers free of charge. As the need for more quilts grew it became clear that an occasional week-long workshop wasn't going to be enough to keep the orders filled. A need for a large, ongoing source of committed volunteers to sew quilts was there. One of Linda's volunteers is a Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) member and felt that LWML could help meet that need! At the South Wisconsin District (SWD) Lutheran Womens Missionary League Fall Retreat, the Camo Quilt Project was presented as an LWML Human Care project.

Glacier Transit and Storage in Plymouth donated a facility for the camoquilt project use. *Not only* is there a loading dock and storage space but we have *an entire facility* large enough to set up a dozen sewing machines with a separate room for cutting. GTS has donated this area for as long as we need it *including the heat and electricity*. Now we have space for volunteers to drop in and work! We'd love to see you, so stop by and say hi.

One of our most-asked questions is, "Doesn't the military provide them with a quilt?" The answer, sadly, is no. Military-issued sleeping bags are bulky and hot and must be carried inside their back-packs. Our Camo Quilt is so popular because it's made from the same camouflage material as the uniforms. That means it can be used in the open, tied to the outside of a soldier's kit, leaving precious room inside for personal items. The camouflage quilt is a small quilt measuring approximately 45" x 72". The quilt folds in thirds and rolls up like a sleeping bag. It is lightweight and has cotton batting so it breathes better in the extreme heat. These quilts are slept on and slept under; they protect the soldiers from the harsh elements they face, both cold winter nights and hot daytime sun. They are even used for pillows. Any person serving in the military and deployed to the Middle East is eligible to receive one of **these quilts!** Each quilt is packaged with a cool tie and a hand-made card. The card gives information about the volunteer group and is signed by some of the volunteers. This gives our quilts a very personal touch! There is **no charge** to the soldiers for the quilts. We just ask that the person requesting the quilts cover the cost of shipping. Volunteers have made and distributed over 1,000 quilts to Soldiers and Marines! **Get Involved -** Donations can be sent to Franklin Legion Post 387 c/o Steven Bender, N7417 Bittersweet Road, Plymouth, WI 53073. 100% of donated money is used directly for the quilts we make! #### **Seasonal Flu**

Prevention can go a long way if the seasonal flu and H1N1 flu challenge your immunity this fall and winter.

Both the seasonal flu and H1N1 flu (swine flu) are contagious diseases. With the use of vaccinations and good hygiene, contracting and spreading these diseases can be lessened or prevented.

Vaccines are the best tools we have to prevent seasonal influenza. The seasonal flu vaccine protects you, your family and other community members from the respiratory flu, which is different from the stomach flu. Symptoms of respiratory flu include fever, cough, trouble breathing, body aches and fatigue.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the seasonal flu vaccine is unlikely to provide protection against the H1N1 influenza. An H1N1 vaccine is not intended to replace the seasonal flu vaccine – it is intended to be used alongside the seasonal flu vaccine. At the time of writing this article, researchers are investigating a possible H1N1 vaccine that may be ready this fall.

Though there are misconceptions that one can receive the flu from the seasonal influenza vaccination, this simply is not possible since the viruses in the shot are inactive. As usual, the CDC recommends a yearly flu vaccination for children six months to 18 years old, adults ages 18 through 49 years of age with chronic health conditions, persons age 50 and older, pregnant women and health care workers. I would also suggest teachers and daycare workers be vaccinated as well.

Precautions should be taken with any type of communicable disease. Preventive steps include: regular washing of hands, covering sneezes or coughs, avoiding crowded places, and getting a vaccination.

Pneumonia vaccines are advised for all people ages 65 and older (unless advised not to) or anyone with chronic health problems. The pneumonia vaccine can be given any time of the year—not just during flu season. Watch for upcoming flu vaccine clinics or make an appointment at Aurora Health Care.
